Invitation to Lent

- PR Keeping up appearances is exhausting. Pretending to be something we are not takes a toll on our spirits. The illusion of perfection makes us weary. Lent invites us into a place of freedom. Let us speak the truth about ourselves and know the truth about God. Trusting in God's abundant, living mercy, let us pray. (Time for silent reflection) ...
- C Amen
- PR Friends in Christ, God Created us to experience joy in communion with the Holy, to love one another, and to live in peace with all of God's creation. However, sin separates us from God, our neighbors, and creation, so that we do not experience the fullness of life our creator intended for us. This grieves our heavenly Creator, whose sole desire is that we turn from sin to God and truly live.

As disciples of the Lord Jesus, we are called to repent, to take up our cross and to follow Jesus. We are to struggle against everything that leads us away from the love of God and neighbor.

I invite you to commit yourselves, to turn from your sin toward God. Return to God with all your heart.

Confession of Sin

An Extended time of silence for self-examination is shared. You are invited, if able, to kneel, during the confession. Wherever necessary, please share space, or move to a vacant space.

- PR Most holy and merciful God,
- C we confess to you and to one another, and before the whole company of heaven, that we have sinned by our fault, by our own fault, by our own most grievous fault, in thought, word, and deed, by what we have done and by what we have left undone.
- PR We have not loved you with our whole heart, and mind, and strength. We have not loved our neighbors as ourselves. We have not forgiven others as we have been forgiven.
- C Have mercy on us, O God.
- PR We have not been honest about our sin, our shame, or our guilt. We choose to hide in darkness and shame, rather than walk in your light..

- PR We have been disobedient to you, O God. We admit our helplessness this night, and something still fights within us to prove ourselves worthy, rather than admit our failure
- C Have mercy on us, O God.

- PR We have been deaf to your call to love others as Christ loves us. We have not been true to the mind of Christ. We have grieved your Holy Spirit.
- C Have mercy on us, O God.
- PR We confess to you our past unfaithfulness; the pride, hypocrisy, and impatience in our lives.
- C Have mercy on us, O God.
- PR We confess our self-indulgent appetites and ways, our exploitation of other people, our placing the material in life before the love of God, neighbor, or ourselves.
- C Have mercy on us, O God.
- PR We confess our anger, our frustration, our need to inflict our will on others, our envy of others.
- C Have mercy on us, O God.
- PR We confess our covetous love of worldly goods and comforts, and our dishonesty with that truth in our daily lives.
- C Have mercy on us, O God.
- PR We confess our negligence in prayer and worship, our unwillingness to yield to your Lordship, and our failure to witness to what we have received from you.
- C Have mercy on us, O God.
- PR We confess our judgmental hearts, our uncharitable thoughts toward our neighbors, our refusal to follow your path of peace, our prejudice and contempt toward those who differ from us.
- C Have mercy on us, O God.
- PR We confess our blindness to the needs and suffering of others, and our indifference to injustice and cruelty.
- C Have mercy on us, O God.
- PR We confess our failure to honor your presence among us, to be community to each other, our willingness to share our lives, our hopes and our fears with one another.
- C Have mercy on us, O God.

A time for additional silent or spoken confession is shared

- PR Restore us, O God, for we cannot restore ourselves, and let your anger depart from us.
- C Hear us, Lord, for we are in bondage to sin. Redeem us by your grace, through Jesus Christ, our Lord, Amen.

The Meal


As we prepare to receive Holy Communion, please read the following:

PR Send your Spirit upon this bread and cup, Christ's body and blood, the food that gives us the strength to persist until joy appears.


Send your Spirit upon us and fortify us to be your body, too, a wellspring of hope for a world in need.



In the name of Jesus our host, Jesus whom we follow into Lent, Jesus who gives us living bread, we are all invited to come and share in the feast.


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

About Our Nave

Against the north wall is the Tree of Life, designed by the late liturgical designer Charles Pohlmann and constructed in 1996 by then-OSLC member Ted Marshall. The processional cross was given to OSLC in memory of Jennie Dana. Many of our paraments were designed and hand-woven by OSLC member Bea Stromberg. The west wall is lined with seven wood carvings depicting the life of Christ commissioned from the late Nigerian carver Lamidi Fakeye. At the center of the nave stands a marble baptismal font, a gift from members of Holy Trinity Lutheran Church. The prints of paintings on the east wall are by nationally known liturgical artist He Qi. The center piece is given by the Church Council in honor of Sam Rasmy for his long-time service as Financial Secretary of OSLC. The Last Supper, by Guatemalan artist Angelina Quic Ixtamer, was purchased by the 2014 Guatemala Mission Team. The OSLC logo was redesigned in 2022 with elements reflecting the unique architecture of the sanctuary, the 2019 addition of the south stained-glass window, our affiliation with the ELCA, and the eternal presence of our Lord and Saviour.

References to the Tree of Life are found in both the Old and New Testaments. It has both literal and symbolic meaning for Christians: it is the literal tree of life in Genesis, and in Revelation it represents everlasting life granted to those who display fruits of the spirit and of righteousness aligned with God's principles.
