Introduction

In The Seed of Joy, Barn Geese Worship writers explore how joy is planted, tended, nurtured, and nourished by God and God's people through the Lenten Revised Common Lectionary for Year B. Lenten Sundays begin with "Persistent Joy," which endures challenging times and flourishes against all odds in oppressive circumstances. Next, we turn to "Expectant Joy," which surprises us with its early arrival and calls our focus to the horizon. "Liberating Joy follows," turning over tables, breaking what binds us, and leaving freedom in its wake. "Transformative Joy" encounters the paradoxical beauty of God's salvation when God turns the source of harm into the source of joy. "Vocational Joy" explores the uniquely life-giving experience when a job, hobby, or passion becomes a vocation that follows God's call faithfully. Holy Week arrives with "Joy Everywhere and Nowhere," dancing in the streets with palms but seemingly fleeing the scene of the crucifixion. Finally, Easter erupts in "Glorious Joy," wild, unrestrained, and all the more beautiful for having outlined the contours of the Lenten season.






¹³The promise that he would inherit the world did not come to Abraham or to his descendants through the law but through the righteousness of faith. ¹⁴If it is the adherents of the law who are to be the heirs, faith is null and the promise is void. ¹⁵For the law brings wrath; but where there is no law, neither is there violation.

¹⁶For this reason it depends on faith, in order that the promise may rest on grace and be guaranteed to all his descendants, not only to the adherents of the law but also to those who share the faith of Abraham (for he is the father of all of us, ¹⁷as it is written, "I have made you the father of many nations")—in the presence of the God in whom he believed, who gives life to the dead and calls into existence the things that do not exist. ¹⁸Hoping against hope, he believed that he would become "the father of many nations," according to what was said, "So numerous shall your descendants be." ¹⁹He did not weaken in faith when he considered his own body, which was already as good as dead (for he was about a hundred years old), or when he considered the barrenness of Sarah's womb. ²⁰No distrust made him waver concerning the promise of God, but he grew strong in his faith as he gave glory to God, ²¹being fully convinced that God was able to do what he had promised. ²²Therefore his faith "was reckoned to him as righteousness." ²³Now the words, "it was reckoned to him," were written not for his sake alone, ²⁴but for ours also. It will be reckoned to us who believe in him who raised Jesus our Lord from the dead, ²⁵who was handed over to death for our trespasses and was raised for our justification.





for the forgiveness of sin. Do this for the remembrance of me.


In the heart of fear and pain, God plants the seed of our joy:


Invitation to Communion



How, then, do we get behind Jesus? How do we practice this expectant joy? In this Lenten season, we might begin by embracing joy even when there's no good reason to feel it; by trusting God's promise even when the world thinks it's a foolish thing to do; by hoping against hope that everything God has offered to us is on its way, and may even be arriving now, in us, around us, and through us.

Questions for reflection

• Which of God's promises do you find yourself reflecting on most often when you need a wellspring of joy? Consider promises in liturgy as well as scripture: baptismal promises, funeral proclamations, the eschatological hope of communion, etc. How do those promises give you joy now, even if you haven't yet seen them fulfilled?

• How does expectant joy show up in your faith community's life? Which of God's promises are celebrated even if they haven't been fulfilled yet, like through a feeding ministry, a Queer-affirming ministry, or an anti-racist ministry?

• Marginalized and oppressed communities are often intimately familiar with ambiguous joy: some voices articulate powerful invitations to rejoice in the present moment in anticipation of a future joy.^[1] What communities in your neighborhood are inviting yours to accompany them in holding expectant joy and working toward that joy's fulfillment?

^[1] For particular examples, consider Martin Luther King, Jr.'s "I Have a Dream" and "I Have Been to the Mountaintop" speeches, Amanda Gorman's poem "The Hill We Climb," and Oscar Romero's final homily.

About Our Nave

Against the north wall is the Tree of Life, designed by the late liturgical designer Charles Pohlmann and constructed in 1996 by then-OSLC member Ted Marshall. The processional cross was given to OSLC in memory of Jennie Dana. Many of our paraments were designed and hand-woven by OSLC member Bea Stromberg. The west wall is lined with seven wood carvings depicting the life of Christ commissioned from the late Nigerian carver Lamidi Fakeye. At the center of the nave stands a marble baptismal font, a gift from members of Holy Trinity Lutheran Church. The prints of paintings on the east wall are by nationally known liturgical artist He Qi. The center piece is given by the Church Council in honor of Sam Rasmy for his long-time service as Financial Secretary of OSLC. The Last Supper, by Guatemalan artist Angelina Quic Ixtamer, was purchased by the 2014 Guatemala Mission Team. The OSLC logo was redesigned in 2022 with elements reflecting the unique architecture of the sanctuary, the 2019 addition of the south stained-glass window, our affiliation with the ELCA, and the eternal presence of our Lord and Saviour.

References to the Tree of Life are found in both the Old and New Testaments. It has both literal and symbolic meaning for Christians: it is the literal tree of life in Genesis, and in Revelation it represents everlasting life granted to those who display fruits of the spirit and of righteousness aligned with God's principles.
